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## A Constituent’s Guide to the Albany Common Council, Part 8: Voting Rules

*Each month, we’ll go back to basics on all things Common Council.*

If your idea becomes a law, earns a spot on the agenda, and makes it through the committee process, you might be ready to bring it to a vote. But a vote is not a vote is not a vote: The Council’s votes are subject to different rules depending on the legislation in question. New York’s [Municipal Home Rule Law](#), the [City Charter](#), and Article 5 of the Common Council’s [Rules of Procedure](#) outline what it takes to pass different types of legislation.

The general rule is this: To pass a local law, ordinance, or resolution, a majority of the entire Council—eight members—must vote in favor of it. But the rules are different for legislation that authorizes the City to take on bond debt. These bills—usually bond ordinances that come out of the City’s end-of-year budget process—require the support of two-thirds of the entire Council; 10 members must vote “yes” for bonding legislation to pass.

The same is true when it comes to overriding mayoral vetoes. At least 10 councilmembers must vote to override vetoed legislation to move it past the Council again. That number increases to 11 for vetoed bonding legislation.

A separate set of rules come into play when the Council is considering legislation that has yet to age properly (more on aging next month). If a newly introduced or amended

local law is pressing enough to include a message of necessity from the Mayor, a 10-member majority of the Council can vote to pass the law. If an ordinance is being considered at the meeting of its introduction, every councilmember in attendance must vote in favor of its passage.

### Ordinance 39.102.23 Sponsored by Frederick

An ordinance authorizing certain purchases by the City of Albany at a maximum estimated cost of \$9,825,000 and authorizing the lease financing or the issuance of \$5,000,000 serial bonds of said City to pay the cost thereof (DGS – Street Reconstruction)

### Ordinance 40.102.23 Sponsored by Frederick

An ordinance authorizing certain purchases by the City of Albany at a maximum estimated cost of \$1,000,000 and authorizing the lease financing or the issuance of \$1,000,000 serial bonds of said City to pay the cost thereof (DGS – ADA Compliance)

**Ordinance 41.102.23 Sponsored by Frederick**

An ordinance authorizing certain purchases by the City of Albany at a maximum estimated cost of \$600,000 and authorizing the lease financing or the issuance of \$600,000 serial bonds of said City to pay the cost thereof (DGS – Sidewalk Reconstruction)

**Ordinance 69.102.23 Sponsored by Frederick**

An ordinance authorizing certain purchases by the City of Albany at a maximum estimated cost of \$588,000 and authorizing the lease financing or the issuance of \$325,000 serial bonds of said City to pay the cost thereof (Recreation – Playgrounds)

**Resolution 1.11.24R Sponsored by Hoey**

A resolution urging the New York State Department of Transportation to adopt a new policy that aligns with the intent of Chapter 496 and allows for the expedient adoption of safer 25 MPH speed limits throughout the state

**Resolution 10.12.24R (MC) Sponsored by Frederick**

A resolution approving the addition of a Violence Prevention Coordinator position within the Common Council, which will affect a salary total

**Resolution 113.112.23R Sponsored by Anane**

A resolution supporting redevelopment of I-787 and the Hudson Riverfront to increase the efficient use of space, economic development, river access, environmental conservation, and aesthetic beauty while maintaining reasonable traffic features that increase pedestrian, biker and motorist safety in the area

**Resolution 2.11.24R (MC) Sponsored by Romero**

A resolution honoring the life and legacy of Hon. Matthew T. Peter and renaming a portion of Lancaster Street in his honor

**Resolution 3.11.24R (MC) Sponsored by Adams**

A resolution calling for a permanent end to violence in Gaza, immediate provision of sufficient humanitarian aid for Gaza, and sustainable peace and unity

**Resolution 5.11.24R (MC) Sponsored by Frederick**

A resolution establishing the locally-adjusted base proportions of the Homestead and Non-Homestead classes for property tax purposes pursuant to Article 19 of the Real Property Tax Law

**Resolution 6.12.24R Sponsored by Kimbrough**

A resolution honoring the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

**Resolution 8.12.24R (MC) Sponsored by Farrell**

A resolution recognizing the contributions of 518 Elevated and recognizing January as National Mentoring Month.
