A Constituent's Guide to the Albany Common Council, Part 10: eCode

Each month, we'll go back to basics on all things Common Council.

The Code of the City of Albany is the official collection of the City's laws. But where are these laws collected? And how are they updated? After all, when the Common Council passes an ordinance or a local law that has an effect on the Code of the City of Albany, the Code must be updated to reflect these changes. This information, in turn, must be easily accessible to members of the public.

The days of municipalities printing and binding vast volumes of code are largely past, though the [Office of the City Clerk](#) does maintain an official print version of the Code. Many municipalities maintain and make available their codes on online platforms like eCode, Municode, and American Legal Publishing's Code Library. That includes the City of Albany, which compiles its code on [eCode](#).

In the days following a piece of legislation's final passage, Council staff send the legislation to eCode for upload and editing into existing law. Staff at General Code (eCode's parent organization) then make the editorial changes to the Code, often including notes referencing the Council's legislation to help guide readers' understanding of how the law has changed.

The final product is a well-maintained and easily accessible library of the [Code of the City of Albany](#). If you see a section of the Code that you would like changed, reach out to [your councilmember](#), and don't forget to study up on [how an idea becomes a law](#).

An ordinance creating the “Task Force on the Municipal Flag” and providing for the responsibilities of the Task Force with respect to creating a contest to determine a new flag for the City of Albany

An ordinance amending the Code of the City of Albany in relation to updating the process for special event permits

Resolution 15.21.24R Sponsored by Balarin

A resolution consenting to the re-appointment of Christopher Burke to the Albany Parking Authority Board of Directors

Resolution 21.31.24R Sponsored by Frederick

A resolution designating NBT Bank as a bank with which the City of Albany may deposit public funds

Resolution 23.31.24R Sponsored by Flynn

A resolution authorizing the Mayor to apply for a FFY 2023-2024 Climate Pollution Reduction Implementation Project Grant through the United States Environmental Protection Agency

Resolution 24.31.24R Sponsored by Keegan

A resolution calling on the New York State Legislature to pass, and the Governor to sign, A170A/S999A, also known as the Access to Representation Act, which establishes the right to legal counsel in immigration court proceedings and provides for the administration thereof

Resolution 25.32.24R Sponsored by Romero

A resolution supporting the passage of the New York State Legislature’s Climate Change Superfund Act, which establishes a climate change adaptation cost recovery program

Resolution 27.32.24R Sponsored by Balarin

A resolution authorizing the implementation, and funding in the first instance 100% of the federal-aid and state "Marchiselli" program-aid eligible costs, of a transportation federal-aid project, and appropriating funds therefore

Resolution 28.32.24R Sponsored by Keegan

A resolution to commemorate March of 2024 as Women’s History Month and honoring the extraordinary contributions of women to the City of Albany

Resolution 31.32.24R Sponsored by Keegan

A resolution in support of the Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Capital Region FY 2025 congressionally directed spending request
