A Constituent’s Guide to the Albany Common Council, Part 10: Never Unnoticed

Each month, we’ll go back to basics on all things Common Council.

Any time the Common Council conducts business, it does so according to rules that ensure constituents are involved in the policymaking process. It’s in the interest of making this process as transparent as possible that both New York State’s [Open Meetings Law](#) and the Council’s [Rules of Procedure](#) lay out guidelines on how the Council holds discussions, including with respect to how and when meetings take place.

Keeping constituents informed of how and when a meeting will take place is what public notice is all about. The basic rules on public notice state that staff must notice a meeting at least 1 week prior to its scheduled date, though in emergency situations, the Council President or a majority of councilmember may call a special meetings with no less than 48 hours’ notice.

When it’s time to post notices, Council staff have a number of tools at their disposal: They use the Council’s [website](#) and [Facebook page](#), the Council’s public listserv, and even a bulletin board outside of the Council’s chambers at City Hall to broadcast meeting information as widely as possible. For long-planned meetings like the Council’s Regular Meetings and Caucus/Work Sessions, staff circulate notice via a Council-approved meeting calendar prior to the first of the year. For committee meetings, staff notice meetings prior to the one-week deadline.

All notices state the time, place, subject, and format of the meeting. (While most meetings are fully in-person, in [rare circumstances](#) they may include public videoconferencing.) You can find current and past meeting notices and plan your next engagement with the Council by visiting our [Agenda Center](#).
