A Constituent’s Guide to the Albany Common Council, Part 3: What’s in a name?

Each month, we’ll go back to basics on all things Common Council.

Every idea that makes it through the legislative drafting process as a local law, ordinance or resolution needs a good name. City staff members title the Council’s legislation with two details in mind: the type of legislation and the order of its introduction.

A local law receives a letter (A-Z) followed by the year of its introduction. The first local law introduced in 2024, for example, will be Local Law A of 2024. The second will be Local Law B of 2024, and so on. It’s important to include the year of introduction when discussing local laws, as a law sharing the same letter as a law in any other year is an entirely different piece of legislation.

The titles of ordinances and resolutions involve some coding and decoding, but they allow for names that are more unique and descriptive than those of local laws. Both types of legislation receive sets of numbers that signify the order, meeting, and year of their introduction. The first set of numbers starts at 1 each January and increases with each new ordinance or resolution introduced. The second set of numbers begins with the month—April is 4, for example—and ends with a number that specifies the meeting in which the legislation was introduced within this month. If you see 5.42 in the first two sets of numbers, you know that you’re looking at the fifth ordinance or resolution of a given year and that it was introduced during the second meeting in April. The third set of numbers signifies the year, and if an “R” attached to the end of the title, you know that you’re looking at a resolution rather than an ordinance. So if you see 5.42.24, think of it as the fifth ordinance of 2024, introduced during the

second meeting in April. Likewise, 13.61.24R signifies the thirteenth resolution of 2024, introduced during the first meeting in June.

The full title of every piece of legislation includes a brief description of what the legislation does: the section of the [City Code](#) it modifies, the goal it expresses, the appointment it confirms, and so on. You can find these titles on the legislation itself or on current or past agendas, depending on whether the legislation is still before the Council. Local Law G of 2023 Sponsored by Planning

A local law amending the Code of the City of Albany in relation to reducing the size of the Historic Resources Commission

Local Law I of 2023 Sponsored by Frederick

A local law amending Article XV (Homestead and Non-Homestead Base Proportions) of Chapter 333 (Taxation) of the Code of the City of Albany in relation to extending the repeal date of such article

Ordinance 11.32.23 Sponsored by Clarke

An ordinance amending the Code of the City of Albany changing the zoning classification of 64 Colvin Avenue, 65 Colvin Avenue, 67 Colvin Avenue and 69 Colvin Avenue from “Mixed-Use Community Urban” to “Mixed-Use Neighborhood Center” and amending the zoning map accordingly

Ordinance 12.32.23 Sponsored by Clarke

An ordinance amending the Code of the City of Albany regarding the maximum number of dwelling units in Mixed-Use Neighborhood Center districts

Ordinance 17.42.23 Sponsored by Romero

An ordinance amending the Code of the City of Albany creating an increasing fee scale and modifying the notice requirements for repeat violations of trash and litter provisions

Ordinance 20.61.23 Sponsored by Clarke

An ordinance authorizing and directing the grant of an easement over a portion of city-owned property at 2 Pitch Pine Road to Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation for the installation and maintenance of a pad-mounted recloser unit and the necessary appurtenances thereto

Ordinance 24.61.23 Sponsored by Zamer

An ordinance amending the Code of the City of Albany codifying the regulations around building materials and mattresses for curbside collection

Ordinance 27.62.23 Sponsored by Frederick

An ordinance amending Ordinance 46.112.22 (As Amended 12/22/2022) which authorized certain purchases by the City of Albany at a maximum estimated cost of \$2,000,000 and authorized the lease financing or the issuance of \$2,000,000 serial bonds of said city to pay the cost thereof (APD – Improvements to APD Facilities) by increasing such authorization to \$3,441,000

An ordinance authorizing the sale of 177 First Street to Michael Lane

Resolution 49.52.23R Sponsored by Balarin

A resolution of the Common Council authorizing the City to accept conveyance of the property at 327 Washington Avenue from the State of New York for public parking and electric vehicle charging purposes

Resolution 54.61.23R Sponsored by Finance

A resolution approving a transfer of budgeted funds and a change in the authorized positions of the Albany Fire Department, which will affect a salary rate or salary total

Resolution 67.62.23R Sponsored by Balarin

A resolution reappointing Jessica Wilcox to the Public, Education, and Government Access Oversight Board

Resolution 75.71.23R Sponsored by Balarin

A resolution consenting to the reappointment of Glinnesa D. Gailliard, Esq., to the City of Albany Planning Board

Resolution 84.81.32R Sponsored by Johnson

A resolution directing the creation of a Hotspot Elimination, Assessment, and Tracking Program

Resolution 85.82.23R Sponsored by Frederick

A resolution authorizing the city treasurer to make a claim against the proceeds from any fire insurance policy insuring 451 Southern Boulevard under Section 22 of the General Municipal Law

Resolution 86.82.23R Sponsored by Balarin

A resolution in honor of LATINFEST 2023

Resolution 87.82.23R Sponsored by Frederick

A resolution certifying to the commissioner of the State Department of Taxation and Finance and to the chief fiscal officer of the Albany City School District the locally-adjusted Homestead and Non-Homestead Base Proportions for school tax year 2023-24, pursuant to Article 19 of the New York State Real Property Tax Law
